

Midland Campus apprenticeship training programs are growing

The Midland Campus has become a hub of apprenticeship training in Central Ontario over the past several months.

On March 4, students in Georgian's first ever mould making class and Midland's first tool and die maker and general machinist classes completed the intermediate level of what is referred to collectively as the Precision, Machining and Tooling trades, or PMT.

PMT spans three levels – basic, intermediate and advanced – and prepares apprentices for careers in this rapidly-growing trade. PMT apprenticeship training in Midland allows apprentices who live and work in the region to take training close to home.

All the apprentices in intermediate PMT at Georgian are registered apprentices with local companies. They were able to easily commute daily to the Midland campus, saving time and money while learning in a world-class facility. A second PMT class (basic) began recently.

The trade of Recreational Vehicle Mechanic is now well-established at the Midland Campus. A class of basic level apprentices attended training last year and a second basic level finished this past Christmas. The intermediate level RV Mechanic apprentices wrapped up training on March 4, and RV Mechanic apprenticeships of all levels will be provided on an ongoing basis.

The completion of these two programs is timed to coincide with the start-up of basic level electrical apprenticeship training on March 7.

Students launch website to help support Ontario colleges campaign

The College Student Alliance has joined the fight to help garner funds, support and respect for Ontario colleges through its "YOU'RE Worth More" campaign.

The campaign is fueled by students who are demanding the Ontario government increase funding to colleges in the 2005-06 Ontario Budget.

"YOU'RE Worth More" encourages students to stand up and make their voice heard through an online petition at <http://www.fundmenow.ca>, which urges Premier McGuinty and his government to bring Ontario's chronically under funded colleges up to the national average by 2007-08.

Students and concerned citizens will also have the opportunity to write Premier Dalton McGuinty and Finance Minister Greg Sorbara directly by logging onto the website.

"Across the province, student governments will be hitting the halls to educate, encourage, and inspire students to tell the provincial government that they are worth more. Ontario's college students are the lowest funded in Canada on a per-student basis. Students are demanding that the Ontario government commit to increased funding to Ontario colleges in the 2005 provincial Budget to reach the national average by 2007-08," said Kerrie McQuaig, President, College Student Alliance.

College students in Ontario are paying at least 145 per cent more in tuition fees than in 1990. During the same time period, the Ontario government has reduced per student operating grants by 17 per cent. This has resulted in increases to the net cost to the student through increases

to ancillary and other user fees, cuts to essential student services, suspension or cancellation of programs, and the reduction of full-time faculty and support staff to a level lower than in 1990.

The College Student Alliance represents 17 colleges and 25 student councils with over 110,000 full-time student members throughout the province.

As of Wednesday, more than 13,500 people had also signed the petition at www.fundcollegesnow.ca, a website petition asking the province to make good on the Rae report and include significantly more money for colleges in the upcoming spring budget.

Beyond signing the petition, Georgian staff members are also urged to write and share their views with those who can

make a difference.

Georgian College Nursing students volunteer in Dominican Republic

A group of 15 Georgian College Nursing students and four faculty members are heading to the Dominican Republic this spring. The students are from the Barrie and Orillia Campuses and include the Practical Nursing and Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree programs.

They won't be basking on the beach at a posh resort. They are taking their expertise to the town of Bani, an impoverished area of the island, where they will spend a week working in local clinics. The group will be staying with three Canadian Sisters of Charity, Sister Peggy, Sister Catherine and Sister Roberta, who have worked in the area for 30 years.

The students will learn about health care in Third World countries and gain clinical experience assisting individuals who have no access to health care. Their itinerary includes touring local hospitals, working in a malnutrition centre, setting up clinics in sugar cane plantations and visiting a leper hospital.

Faculty members Sylvia van der Weg, Lynn Hoath, Sheila Wojcek and Jane Barnes will accompany the students on this mission of mercy.

According to van der Weg, the students will do assessments, treatments, help those they can, and refer patients to a local Dominican doctor who will be available at the clinic. They will also provide information to parents on proper nutrition and care for their children.

"This is a great experience for the students to see what health care challenges exist in developing countries," said van der Weg. "Last year our students helped more than 750 people in one week."

As well as paying their own way, the students are expected to round up and bring medical supplies, including over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, bandages and dressings, anything they might need to help patients in their clinics. They will spend the next few months soliciting donations from around the community. Although

everything is needed, they cannot accept out-of-date medications or narcotics. Cash donations will be used to purchase needed items, such as parasite medication, beyond those donated.

Two of the student volunteers, Matthew Hamilton and Joanne Mercer, are looking forward to having an opportunity to help the less fortunate.

Hamilton wants to "travel to the loneliest places on the planet to help the poorest of the poor". He wants to "do something to help others".

Mercer says "I hope that this experience will lead me to a lifetime of doing volunteer work in countries that are in need of nursing care".

This year for the first time, a second week is planned for Registered Nurses and Registered Practical Nurses who work in the agencies that provide practicum for Georgian College Nursing students. For a number of years the Georgian team has been asked to provide a nursing experience in a developing country for working nurses, similar to the student experience. This year, it will happen.

On April 28, 16 nurses from local hospitals and community agencies will travel to Bani or St. Jose de Ocoa

in the Dominican Republic and will be actively involved in nursing clinics, home visits, teaching, and learning more about health care in the Caribbean nation.

Jane Armstrong, a Registered Nurse, will be one of the volunteers.

"I've always wanted to do a mission trip like this to help others. I can't tell you how excited I was to hear I was accepted to go. It's going to be a real learning experience, as well as a great opportunity to do some good," said Armstrong.

"With the two groups going this year, we have an opportunity to really make a difference to the people in the regions we are visiting. Each person will take two hockey bags full of supplies and medications. Our biggest need this year is vitamins, and we welcome donations of infant, children's and adult vitamins."

"For all the participants, it is a physically and emotionally tough week. The days are long and for some, it's the first time they stare poverty in the face," said van der Weg.

RAP and PGM students work with top industry experts at golf summit

Ten Georgian College students from the Research Analyst (RAP) and Professional Golf Management (PGM) programs volunteered two days out of their reading week and worked with top golf industry representatives at the National Allied Golf Association Play Golf Summit, Feb. 23-24.

More than 170 golf course owners, club managers, golf directors and industry association leaders gathered for the first annual summit at the Royal York Hotel in Toronto to strategize the business of golf and identify actions to grow the game of golf.

The students were deeply involved in the Summit. First, they designed and analyzed the responses from delegates to the web survey prior to the summit. Delegates were asked to envision golf in the year 2020 and describe the three most important issues that need to be addressed to reach this vision.

Important issues worth noting included growing the game by attracting new players (women, youth), addressing the price to play, the time it takes to play a round, making golf fun, and co-operation of associations. The survey results were presented at the opening of the two-day summit by RAP co-ordinator Robert Wong, with assistance of RAP and PGM students.

Under the guidance of Brad Doey, PGM Program

Manager; John Daggett, PGM co-op officer; and Shawn Robertson, PGM faculty member, the technology savvy students worked along side conference facilitators to capture the ideas at round table discussions efficiently on their Palm computers or laptops.
